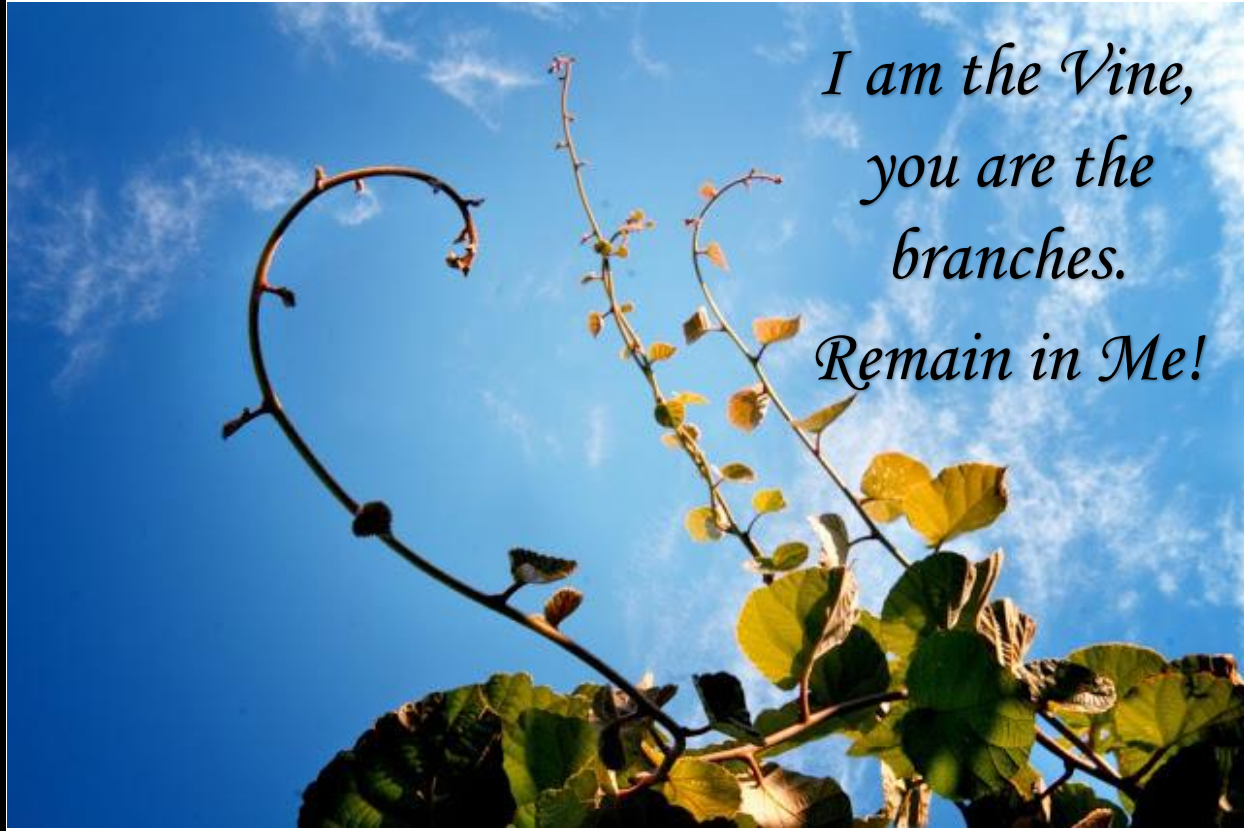

MUSINGS

The 5th Sunday of Easter – Some Musings

“You have already been cleansed by the words that I have spoken to you.”

The spring rains nourish the earth, the early seeds and plants, giving them the strength to develop and grow. The sun warms the world encouraging that growth. After a lovely rain we can smell the damp earth and see the cleansed leaves and grasses. It's a time for the earth to flourish and give praise to its Creator. The teachings of Jesus are meant to do the same for us; to give us a new way of life, a new way of interacting with our sisters and brothers, of caring for one another and the earth. Those teachings are meant to give us life for as Jesus has told us, “I am the way, the truth and the life”. We, like the plants, need to give Him glory by our deeds and our words. Being cleansed by the words of our Lord is being washed in His Blood and clinging to Him with every fibre of our being. It's a call to true discipleship. As those branches cling to the vine to give them life and make them fruitful so too, our lives are meant to give life to others. We do not live in isolation but in a community: Like the branches we cling to the vine and also to one another. There's a lovely story that I read years ago called “The Little Grape Stem” and I'd like to share it with you now. “Once upon a time there was a little grape stem. This stem was so glad to be alive. She drank water and minerals from the soil and grew and grew. She was young and strong and could manage quite well. ALL BY HERSELF. But then the rain was harsh, the snow not one bit understanding and the little stem suffered; she drooped, weak and suffering. It would be so easy to stop trying to grow, to stop trying to live. And the grape stem was poor. The winter was long, and the little grape stem was very weary. But then the little grape stem heard a voice. It was another grape stem calling out to her, ‘Here, reach out . . . hang on to me.’ But the little stem hesitated. “What would this mean?” she thought. For you see, the little stem had always managed quite well. ALL BY HERSELF. But then ever so cautiously, she reached out toward the other grape stem. “See, I can help you” it said. “Just wrap your tendrils about me and I will help you lift your head.” And the little grape stem trusted and suddenly she could stand straight again! And the wind came, and the rain and the snow, but when it came the little grape stem was clinging to many other grape stems. And although the stems were swayed by the wind and frozen by the snow, they stood strongly united to one another. In their united strength they could smile and grow. Then one day the little stem looked down and saw a tiny stem swaying and frightened and our little stem said, “Here, reach out . . . I can help you.” And the other stem reached out to our stem and together all the stems grew, leaves budded, flowers bloomed, and finally grapes formed. AND THE GRAPES FED MANY.” Like that little stem let's reach out to one another, unite our strength and cling to the vine. We are meant to live in community and while this pandemic has made that a tough road to follow, let's seek ways in which we can reach out to others. We have access to so many forms of media in which to do that. Let's advantage ourselves of those things and while we may have to keep our distance physically, let's reach out through those devices and through prayer to make sure no one stands alone.

PARISH NEWS & EVENTS

LITANY TO THE BLESSED VIRGIN MARY: After each weekday mass, **we are invited to pray the Litany to the Blessed Virgin Mary.** The Litany of Loreto takes its name from the Marian shrine of Loreto in Italy, where it is believed to have been used as far back as 1531. It was officially approved in 1587 by Pope Sixtus V, who suppressed all other Marian litanies used publicly. The Litany of Loreto is the only approved Marian litany. However, many more Marian litanies were and are in use, but are designated for private devotion, as is evident, for example, in the so-called *Officia Mariana*. Through the centuries at least 7 new invocations to Mary were added. Saint Pope John Paul II added “Mother of the Church” in 1980, and “Queen of families” in 1995. **Pope Francis has added three more in June 2020. “Mother of mercy”, “Mother of hope” and “Solace of migrants”.**

NET FUNDRAISING: We are grateful that our Diocese and Sacred Heart parish have brought a NET Ministries team to Whitehorse. The current NET team will be here until the end of May and a new team will come next October to continue the work that has been started. The team is involved in music ministry, leading the high school and middle school youth groups at Sacred Heart, doing outreach to youth in our high school, elementary schools and missions. They are part of a larger network of young missionaries who are taking a year off to bring Canadian youth towards a deeper love of Christ. They are here to support our Catholic schools and to be another avenue (peer-led) for inviting youth, whether Catholic, Christian or secular, into an authentic dialogue about faith and spirituality. The NET Project is an investment into Catholic youth ministry in the Yukon. The Diocese and Sacred Heart are sharing this expense. The cost for the current team is approximately \$42,000. Sacred Heart is responsible for \$21,000. **We made a goal to raise \$25,000 for this year to cover any additional youth ministry costs. We ask for your prayers that their work will touch the hearts of our youth. VATICAN and DIOCESAN NEWS AND EVENTS

PRAYERS FOR THE END OF THE PANDEMIC: Catholics across the globe are encouraged to dedicate the Marian month of May to praying for an end to the pandemic. “The initiative will involve all the Shrines of the world in a special way, so that they might encourage the faithful, families, and communities to recite the Rosary to pray for an end to the pandemic,” read the statement.

Pope Francis will open the Marian month of prayer on 1 May with a Rosary broadcast across Vatican Media’s platforms.

“Michelangelo left many unfinished sculptures, four of which can be seen in the museum in Florence. **They are incomplete slave figures, with parts of their bodies still being immersed in marble.** These sculptures have been interpreted in many ways. As we see them, in various stages of completion, they evoke the enormous strength of the creative concept as they **try to free themselves from the bonds and physical weight of the marble.** It is now claimed that the **artist deliberately left them incomplete to represent this eternal struggle of human beings to free themselves from their material trappings.**

In the spiritual field, **we are these unfinished sculptures.** Our spirit fights to liberate us from materiality. Sculpture cannot get out of marble without the help of a sculptor and its chisel. **We cannot achieve our humanity without the help of God and His cross.** The craftsman must reject unnecessary marble sheds in order to extract the hidden beauty. **We, with the help of God, must reject our pride, greed, selfishness, fear, so that our beauty may appear.”**
