23-rd Sunday in Ordinary Time, 2023. Beatification of the Ulma family.

- 1.In Poland, during World War II, the Germans passed a law according to which people hiding Jews were sentenced to death immediately, without trial, along with their entire family. In spite of this, during the occupation, the married couple Józef and Wiktoria Ulma, who lived in Markowa, Poland, hid eight Jews in the attic of their house for 1.5 years. On March 24, 1944, the Germans surrounded their house and first killed the Jews in hiding. Then they led the Ulma family out of the house and into the yard and shot Józef there, and later the pregnant Wiktoria, who started to give birth when she was shot. Then their 6 children were shot, the oldest of whom was 8 years old and the youngest 1.5 years old.
- 2.Today, in the small village of Markowa in Poland, a unique event in the history of the Church has taken place. The whole family, including the unborn child, has been proclaimed blessed for martyrdom. This beatification is unique in many ways. First, there is the beatification of the married couple. The second aspect is the beatification of small children, from 1.5 to 8 years old. The third dimension and the most revolutionary is the beatification of the unborn and unbaptized child. There has never been such a situation in the history of the Church. Let us try to see what this beatification tells us about our call to holiness.
- 3.What does the beatification of Joseph and Victoria teach us? The Ulmas were a loving couple who built their future based on the sacrament of marriage. This sacrament is a special gift of Jesus' presence in the relationship between man and woman. It is a unique sacrament that Józef and Wiktoria gave to each other in the presence of a priest, on July 7, 1935, in the parish church, in Markowa. It was Jesus who taught them how to build and live their marital relationship. The Ulmas are witnesses of love and of openness to new life.
- 4.Joseph Ulma marked out two places in the Holy Scripture. The first passage speaks of love of God and love of neighbor; the second describes the Good Samaritan. In the life of Joseph and Victoria, these verses were completely fulfilled in great love for God and, on the other hand, also for man, readiness for sacrifice, which was manifested precisely in love for children, whom the spouses always welcomed with great openness. Then also in a very great and courageous love for the Jews whom they were hiding at that time. In other words, Joseph and Victoria loved God and were therefore able to love the other people whom God had placed in their path. The priest who was responsible for preparing the whole beatification process called them "Samaritans from Markowa". But something profound was pointed out to him: in the Gospel story, the Samaritan was not risking anything in helping the wounded man, but had spent his time and some money.
- 5. The Ulma spouses are witnesses of life. They are open to new life in their family and it can be said that they sang the "Canticle of Life" all their life. This canticle was sung by their small children, who filled the family home with their laughter. The holy spouses opened a home not only for their children, but in the name of love of neighbor, they opened their home to 8 persecuted Jews.

By helping the persecuted Jews, Józef and Wiktoria risked the lives of their whole family.

6.What does the beatification of 6 children aged 1.5 to 8 years old teach us? Well, first, it reminds us that the Church has the indestructible certainty of faith for the salvation of baptized children who have died before reaching the maturity of conscience and will. In other words, little children are incapable of committing sin. (I'm not saying they can't upset us or even bring us to tears.) Their maturity was also emphasized. This maturity manifested itself in the fact that it was not they who betrayed their parents. It was not because of the children's talkativeness or naivety that the Germans learned about the Jews in hiding. Another fact that served in the beatification process was the

similarity to the death of the holy innocents who were killed by Herod's soldiers. These small children did not have maturity of conscience, but they did have their lives to give up for Jesus.

- 7. The beatification of the Ulmas' unborn and un-baptized child is an expression of the Church's deepened reflection on the fate of children who die before being born, and children who die after birth but before being baptized. This beatification is a conscious act of the Church confirming that saints can be children who die before being baptized. So far, the Church has spoken of "hope for salvation." From this day forward, through the beatification of the unborn child, the Church speaks clearly of the "certainty of salvation", because the child received the baptism of blood when suffering martyrdom with his mother.
- 8. The Ulmas were faithful to God. They fulfilled their vocation through daily fidelity to the obligations flowing from the marriage vow on their wedding day. This was manifested, among other things, by accepting another child a new life. Martyrdom was not born at some point in isolation from the past. That's what one grows up for. The Lord God leads each of us on a specific path. Each one of us is invited to the summit of holiness, and we realize this through fidelity to the truth, the goodness of the Gospel. We are all invited to follow this path, the path to freedom, happiness, the great affirmation of life, marriage, and family.
- 9.What can I say in the end? 4 months after the murder of the Ulma family, the German occupation of Markowa ended. And just then, 20 Jews who were hiding in other houses in this village came out of hiding. Despite the horrific events of the Ulmas' execution on March 24, 1944, no one had thrown these 20 Jews out of their houses or reported them to the Germans. In other words, there were more Good Samaritans in this village.

For the active involvement, participation, cooperation and collaboration of the parents, educators, church leaders and lay workers, volunteers, and children in putting concerted efforts and resources for the success of the Sacramental catechesis and solemnization of Confirmation, Holy Communion and Reconciliation this coming October. Let us pray to the Lord. Have mercy on us, O Lord, hear our prayers.
- 5. For us all here present in this Holy Eucharist and those left at home, that the Holy Spirit will imbue in us the great moments of examining our consciences and our hearts and give us the grace to be humble enough to acknowledge our sins, shortcomings and failures to our own selves, to others and to God, and inspire us to seek filial and sacramental reconciliation.



On Spirituality: Our Exemplary Challenge and Responsibility Beyond Reproach

FAMILY BEATIFICATION: The First Ever In the History of the Church.

Josef and Wiktoria Ulma Family, the Martyred Polish Family set to be Beatified on September 10, 2023, in Markowa, Poland



Józef and Wiktoria Ulma, who lived in the village during the Second World War, gave shelter to eight Jews for almost two years in German-occupied Poland, hiding them from the Nazi regime. The Ulmas had seven children, including the unborn child in Wiktoria's womb. The German, informed by a local policeman that Jews were being hidden in the household, came early in the morning March 24, 1944, right before Easter. First, they killed all eight of the Jewish fugitives. Then they shot and killed Wiktoria and Józef and all of their children.

"They have made heroic gestures of mercy. One of the tasks of parents is the Christian upbringing of children ... not just to teach their children Christian doctrine. ... It is not a matter of words. One must set a good example,"

Cardinal Semeraro admitted that it deeply affected him when he learned that the theological consultants of the beatification cause evaluated that the unborn child also can be beatified.

"Blood baptism happens very rarely. A baby barely born was immediate killed (Wiktoria started to give birth when she was shot). Its parents made faith in the face of the love of the Lord Jesus," he emphasized.

Father Witold Burda, postulator of the sainthood cause of the Ulma family, said at a press conference Aug. 10 in Markowa that the **Ulma family are martyrs who were killed** "because of hatred toward faith."

The first reading planned for the beatification Mass, will be from 2 Maccabees, Chapter 7: "Martyrdom of a Mother and Her Seven Sons," followed by Psalm 116 with the refrain, "Dear in the eyes of the Lord is the death of his devoted." The second reading will be from Chapter 3 of the Letter to Colossians, in which St. Paul encourages mercy, compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness and patience. Finally, the Gospel reading will be from St. Luke – the parable of the good Samaritan.

The parable of the Good Samaritan was highlighted with a pencil by Józef Ulma in the family Bible, which is displayed in the Museum of Poles Saving Jews in World War II, located in Markowa.

"Józef Ulma was impressed by the parable of the Good Samaritan. ... This confirms the disposition of this man's soul in giving aid to the Jews. ... We can certainly note that Wiktoria and Józef Ulma read the Scriptures together. The story of the abandoned man who was rescued by the Good Samaritan must have firmly entered the hearts of both of them," Cardinal Semeraro said.

The postulator of the Ulmas' sainthood cause confirmed that the liturgical feast of the Ulma family will be July 7, the anniversary of their wedding in 1935.

An inscription put at the family grave says: "Here rests the family of $Ulma\ J\'ozef\ murdered\ by\ Hitler's\ thugs."$

Markowa is situated only 50 miles from the Polish-Ukrainian border. When the war in Ukraine started in February 2022, people in the village did not hesitate to do what their ancestors taught them: They sheltered Ukrainians in their homes.



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The 23rd Sunday in Ordinary Time – Some Musings

"Wherever two or three are gathered in my name, I am there among them."

The day broke on blue skies, puffy white clouds and soft winds making the curtains billow in welcome to another call to serve the Lord with gladness and peace. The day ahead held some small tasks and a wonderful evening with dinner and friends. These friends are not Catholic, yet I knew that when we all sat down to eat, we'd all pause while one of us said grace. We never start eating without doing that. I make the sign of the cross and they wait patiently until one of starts with the blessing. If we go out for dinner we also pray, perhaps not always with the same exuberance of our prayers at our own dinner tables but we do pray. We are three gathered in His name; giving Him praise and asking His blessing on our food and those of us gathered in His name. If we eat alone, we should always bow our heads and give Him praise and thanks. We need to remember the Giver of all our blessings; we need to ask His help for those going without proper food and drink; for those struggling with addictions of all kinds. When we give Him thanks our simplest meal becomes a feast.

Being a Christian is not just about going to church on Sunday; it's about living our lives the way He would have us do. It means loving others, doing our part in the great family of God and of treating others as we would want to be treated. There's been a saying going the rounds that says sitting in a garage doesn't make you a car. Well, sitting in a church doesn't make you a Christian either. If we really want to be a Christian we have to become more Christ-like; giving comfort, looking after those less fortunate than we are, more patient and giving of our goods and our time.

When we gather at the table of His Body and Blood we are gathered in His name and He is there among us from the smallest child to the oldest adult, with the rich and the poor, to those whose faith is unflagging to those who struggle with belief. We should spend time in quiet conversation with our Lord and King, asking His blessing on all gathered there and sitting in calm stillness waiting to hear His answer to our prayers with confidence in His promise to be with us till the end of the age.

As we settle into our regular fall routines, let's be sure we carve a good portion of our time for prayer and let's make part of that prayer asking for the grace to be more loving of God and others. And when we interact with others, whether that's in prayer or play, let's remember that as Christians we are gathered in His name. Whether those with us are Christians or not, let's remember that all people are created in His likeness and image. All are loved by Him and should be loved by us.

The days are getting shorter and I've started to prepare my warmer clothes so the chill winds won't find me unprepared, and as I was ironing some sweaters the other day, I wished that there was some warm iron that could press out the wrinkles in my faith life. It was one of those hot steamy days and yet I knew that we'd soon be in the claws of winter. I took a moment to pray for the grace to be present to my brothers and sisters wherever I might meet them.

The sun is setting now and the sky is painted by the hand of God, who as one of my young sons once said, "God finger paints real good". It is time to brush off our dusty faith practices and polish them to the brilliance due to our Lord and Saviour. Wherever we meet others, let's make a real effort to remember that God is there among us: perhaps that realization will enable us to treat others in a way that would meet the approval of our heavenly Father.
