### The Words of the Lord for the 22<sup>nd</sup> Sunday in Ordinary Time – Year A

Antiphon: cf. Psalm 86 (85):3, 5

Have mercy on me, O Lord, for I cry to you all the day long. O Lord, you are good and forgiving, full of mercy to all who call to you

### **Reading 1:** Jeremiah 20:7-9 (124A)

You duped me, O LORD, and I let myself be duped; you were too strong for me, and you triumphed. All the day I am an object of laughter; everyone mocks me.

Whenever I speak, I must cry out, violence and outrage is my message; the word of the LORD has brought me derision and reproach all the day.

I say to myself, I will not mention him, I will speak in his name no more. But then it becomes like fire burning in my heart, imprisoned in my bones; I grow weary holding it in, I cannot endure it.

Gospel Acclamation: cf. Ephesians 1:17-18

Alleluia, Alleluia! May the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ enlighten the eyes of our hearts, that we may know what is the hope that belongs to our call. Alleluia. Alleluia!

GOSPEL: Matthew 16:21-27

Jesus began to show His disciples that He must go to Jerusalem and suffer greatly from the elders, the chief priests, and the scribes, and be killed and on the third day be raised. Then Peter took Jesus aside and began to rebuke him, "God forbid, Lord! No such thing shall ever happen to you." He turned and said to Peter.

"Get behind me, Satan! You are an obstacle to me. You are thinking not as God does, but as human beings do."

Then Jesus said to his disciples, "Whoever wishes to come after me must deny himself, take up his cross, and follow me. For whoever wishes to save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for my sake will find it. What profit would there be for one to gain the whole world and forfeit his life? Or what can one give in exchange for his life? For the Son of Man will come with his angels in his Father's glory, and then he will repay all according to his conduct."

The Gospel of the Lord. Praise to You, Lord Jesus Christ.

### **Summary of the Readings**

- First Reading <u>Jeremiah 20:7-9</u>: You, O LORD, overcame me, and though I'm mocked and derided, I cannot hold back your word. It burns in my heart, and I cannot endure keeping it inside.
- Responsorial Psalm Psalm 63: O God, I seek you with a thirst like dry, lifeless earth. I've seen your power and glory; your kindness is greater than life. My soul clings to you, and your right hand upholds me.
   Response: My soul thirst for you, O Lord, my God.
- **Second Reading** Romans 12:1-2: I urge you to offer yourselves as a living sacrifice, holy and pleasing to God. Don't conform to this age but renew your mind to discern what is good and pleasing to God.
- Gospel <u>Matthew 16:21-27</u>: Jesus begins to explain that He must suffer, be killed, and resurrect. Peter rebukes Him, but Jesus says that Peter's thinking like a man, not God. He tells His followers to deny themselves, take up their crosses, and follow Him. Gaining the world but losing one's soul is futile. The Son of Man will come and reward each according to their deeds. (young-catholics.com)

The readings focus on our **Suffering as a divine state of grace for our longing of the Lord, Jesus Christ, and the means of sanctification of our souls.** The first reading showed that Jeremiah realized he cannot escape his burning desire for God. The second reading revealed to us that we must allow ourselves to be sanctified to be one with Christ. Then Jesus explained the gospel that by following Him as His disciples means making extraordinary sacrifices, we must be ready and willing to suffer and surrender our life not only for our sake but for others too, for the glory of God. Further, that we must understand and embrace the mysterious essence of Suffering. It is by suffering that we bring ourselves intimately closer to Him and become genuinely true to Him. Now, do we still question Him: Why, Lord? Why Me? Why Us? Or shall we say: Here I am Lord, If You will, lead me, send me. (Vicenta, LRB)

### From the young-catholics.com

Possible themes for this weekend's readings are sacrificial love, longing for God, prayer, and water.

- 1) Unwavering Resolve: In the first reading, Jeremiah affirms his commitment to proclaiming God's message despite the challenges. This theme reflects the determination to persevere in one's calling, even in the face of adversity.
- **2) Living Sacrifice**: The second reading encourages believers to present themselves as living sacrifices to God. This theme emphasizes the idea of offering one's whole life in dedicated service to God.
- 3) **Suffering Messiah**: The gospel highlights Jesus' prediction of His own suffering, death, and resurrection. This theme emphasizes the sacrificial aspect of His mission.
- **4) Human Ambitions vs. God's Will**: Jesus rebukes Peter for opposing His path of suffering. This theme underscores the contrast between human desires and God's divine plan.
- 5) Self-Denial and Cross-Bearing: Jesus talks about taking up the cross to follow Him. This theme stresses the need for self-denial and a willingness to embrace difficulties for the sake of Christ.
- **6) Sacrificing Earthly Gain**: Jesus mentions gaining the world but losing one's soul. This theme highlights the importance of prioritizing eternal values over temporary worldly gains.
- 7) **Judgment and Reward**: The passage discusses the Son of Man coming to reward each person according to their deeds. This theme emphasizes accountability and the ultimate consequences of one's choices.

### **Embracing Suffering: A Gritty Path to Transformed Hope**

In the gospel for the 22nd Sunday in Ordinary Time Year A (Matthew 16:21-27), Jesus lays it out plainly to his disciples: suffering is on the horizon. It's a tough pill to swallow. Suffering can grip us, making everything else fade to gray. No one signs up for suffering willingly. Peter, one of Jesus' closest friends, recoiled at the idea of Jesus enduring the cross. Who would wish that on someone they care about?

But Jesus has a different angle on it. He's all about marching forward, unflinching, doing God's will. It's a game-changer. He believes suffering can be transformed, even death doesn't have the final say. That's quite the perspective

shift. And it's not just about us going through it. When we're in the suffering trenches, we've got to cling to the promise Jesus offers.

Plus, there's something about being there for others who are hurting. Even if you can't fix it all, being a companion in their pain matters. Jesus showed us that suffering isn't the endgame, God's mercy can trump it all. So, in a nutshell, suffering isn't a detour off the path, but a gritty part of it. And it's not about avoiding it, but holding onto hope when it's tough.

Remember, Peter tried to dodge it, but Jesus didn't flinch. He faced the worst head-on, all for a bigger plan. So, next time suffering knocks at your door, don't shut it out. And if you see someone else in the trenches, be that shoulder to lean on. Because just like Jesus, we're not alone in this. (Homilies and reflections from the young-catholics.com)

Keep me safe from harm.





1st Reading: Jeremiah 20:7-9 (124A) The word of the Lord has become for me reproach and derision.

Responsorial Psalm: Ps 63: 1, 2-2, 4-5, 7-8 Response. 1a: My soul thirst for You, O Lord my God.

Reading 2: Romans 12. 1-2: Present your bodies as a living sacrifice.

Gospel: Matthew 16:21-27: If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves.

### Reflections:

Reflect, today, upon the words "Take up your cross and follow Me." Jesus instructed us on how we should live and how we will share in His gift of eternal life. What cross in your life are you fearful of? What act of sacrifice do you avoid? True love hurts in the sense that it is always selfless. We must die to ourselves.



#### Praver:

My sacrificial Lord, You did not fear laying down Your sacred life for us all. You embraced Your mission of love by entering into death itself so that we could die with You and thus share in Your Resurrection. Antiphon: Cf. Psalm 26

Are there things you have reacted strongly to and even with a form of rage? Pray for courage, compassion, clarity and love so that you will be able to imitate Jesus as He sought to move those of His own hometown out of the indifference they were experiencing.

### Prayer:

My challenging Lord, You desire that all Your children turn to You with their whole heart. Your chastisements are acts of mercy meant to move us out of indifference. Please speak to me the truths that I need to hear this day and use me to share Your holy word with others, especially those of my own family. Jesus, I trust in You. (My Catholic Life-MCL)

Reflect, today, upon the infinite spiritual authority and power of our Lord. It is a power beyond anything else we could imagine. He wants to exercise this authority in your life out of love. What is hindering Him from taking greater control of your life? What sin or temptation does Jesus want to rebuke in your life? From what oppression does He want to set you free? Reflect upon yourself being a member of the town of Capernaum who fully welcomes Jesus, is amazed at Him and desires Him in your life. His working in your life depends upon you and your response to Him. Call on Him and let Him in.

### Prayer

My most powerful Lord, You and You alone are able to take authority over my life and bring order and peace. Please remove any doubt and stubbornness from my heart so that I can open myself to You and Your grace. Take authority of my life, dear Lord, and lead me into Your most holy will. Jesus, I trust in You. (My Catholic Life - MCL)

September 6, 2023 WEDNESDAY

Antiphon: (Cf. Psalm 27)

The Lord is the strength of His people, a saving refuge for the one he has anointed. Save your people, Lord, and bless Your heritage, and govern them forever.

1st Reading: **Colossians 1, 1-8:** The word of Truth has come to You just as it is growing in the whole world.

Responsorial Psalm: Psalm 52.8, 9 Response 8b: I trust in the kindness of God forever.

Gospel: Luke 4, 38-44: I must proclaim the good news to other cities, for I was sent for this purpose.

Gospel: Luke 5.1-11: Simon and his partners left everything and followed Jesus.

#### Reflections:

Reflect, today, upon this image of Simon Peter on his knees before Jesus. See his humility and honesty. See his sincerity and interior awareness. And see his understanding of the divine power of Jesus before him. Pray that you, too, will see our Lord, experience your sin, humble yourself before Him and hear Him call you to radically and completely follow after Him wherever He leads.

The other morning I was awakened by the sounds of thunder and pelleting rain. We have had an unusual summer with a good balance of sun and rain. I don't ever remember an August when the trees and the grass were so green. The beauty of this August has made my heart sing with praise to our loving Father. As I left the house, the storm was over and the sun shone on my face. As I blessed the Lord I asked that He give me a joyful and thankful spirit to meet the tasks of my day. It was a day when it was not too challenging to pick up my cross and follow Him. Unlike Jesus, I am not carrying a cross burdened by the sins of the world. But I often complain about the cross I am carrying.

Being cheerful in the face of adversity is not always easy or comfortable. Sometimes our patience is tried beyond all hope of endurance and we lash out with tongues blazing fire like some demented dragon and with our fists clenched ready for the fight. We're not always ready to turn the other cheek are we? And how will we be judged at the end of time? Our God is not vengeful, He is just and when He says, "I will repay each one according to their deeds" He means exactly that. We cannot know the mind of God, but our human understanding tells us whether our deeds build up the Body of Christ or tear it down.

Reading the lives of the saints gives us a deeper understanding of what it means to live as a child of a loving Father. Many of them were not saintly at the beginning of their lives but over time they came to a knowledge of how one is meant to live one's life. Sometimes being a child of God takes its toll on us. We can be called to look after an aging parent, a sick child, a dying spouse. Living with crosses like these drains us and we may become resentful and unhappy.

At times like these calling on our heavenly Father to strengthen and assist us helps us carry these burdens, if not joyfully, at least with a patient heart. Becoming a disciple means loving God and our neighbour. Think about that. We are called to love our neighbors as ourselves which means that we must love ourselves. This is not a selfish kind of love but a love that means we take care of ourselves so we can truly take care of others.

We are sometimes so caught up in the concerns of daily living that we forget to take care of that most vital part of our lives — our prayer life. If I take time each morning to spend some time in prayer, my day goes so much better. The other week I was so frustrated with the concerns of what I had to do that week that I found myself, saying my morning devotions with a distracted spirit and wandering mind. Needless to say, that day was not productive. I could not keep my mind focused on the mundane tasks of my life and by the end of the day I was even more frustrated than before. As I said my night prayers, I asked for the grace, strength and peace of heart that would help me be more productive the next day. And He answered. Coincidence? I think not!

And here we are at the beginning of September. We'll soon be back into our regular routine of living; the ordinary time. As we re-establish those routines and make new ones, let's schedule some quality time for prayer and thanksgiving, for worship and praise. When those small miracles come our way, let's take time to thank the Giver of the gift. I have always liked Ordinary time for it's there that we live the majority of our lives. It's in the ordinary time that we work and play, love and worship; so as we begin fall this year, let's praise Him for all the ordinary things in our lives that give us joy, that challenge us, times in which we see

God in the glory of His creation and the beauty that surrounds us. In all the great events, the births, the weddings, the celebrations of life passages, we need to remember that the Giver of these blessings has asked that we pick up our daily crosses and follow Him with a joyful heart and a spirit of love for Him and others.
