

The Feast of Christ the King – Some Musings

“Let us go rejoicing to the house of the Lord.”

The sun is shining and the breeze, although cool, still does not have the gripping claws of deep winter. Some of the trees still have leaves and while we have seen our first bit of snow it was not a crippling blizzard. It has been a fall among all falls, a time when we can still go out not being bundled to the chin. And yet here we are in the final week of this year’s Ordinary Time. Next weekend we begin the Season of Advent as we prepare our hearts and our homes for the celebration of the anniversary of Christ’s coming to earth as a child, Christ the King, born to two young people, not in the sterile environment of a hospital but a manger. Each year we find ourselves in a flurry of activity as we make these preparations. The media will be bombarding us with advertisements of all the newest gadgets and toys available; the stores will be playing music, much of which has nothing whatever to do with that miraculous birth. Many of the TV stations will show movies, you know, those of the feel good kind. However, the gospel for this weekend, tells us why our Lord, left His Father, came to earth to live among us, His people, and ultimately die for us. Ours is not a king who comes to conquer a specific group of people like some hero of old, He came to conquer death. What a gift that is! Ours is a king of love and compassion for us, His wayward and often stubborn people.

When we consider the world leaders of this age, they are often men and women who are in power for their own gain. Jesus, however, came “that we might have life and have it to the full”. Not only in this life and world, but in the world to come. The ancient Israelites did well when they were ruled by God’s laws but once they had a king who made his own laws and decrees, their place in the world started to deteriorate and they soon found themselves conquered by other powers and taken into bondage. The same can be said of us. When we follow God’s laws we do well; we can be happy in this life and look forward to the next life. However, when we stray from that path, and follow our own ways, or the dictates of others, we find ourselves bound in sin and distress.

As we live this last week of the Ordinary Time of 2022, let’s take an oath to live as children of a loving and mighty God, and when we come to the first day of Advent, let’s go rejoicing into God’s house and vow to keep His word, live by His statutes and decrees. Let’s become the people who take His word and His love to all we meet in our very ordinary lives and so deserve to be called His children and become worthy, at the end of this life, to dwell in the house of the Lord.
