

The Ascension of the Lord – Some Musings

“ . . . after He had spoken to them was taken up to heaven and sat down at the right hand of God.”

As Children, my brother, sister and I would lie on our backs in the summer sun and watch the clouds as they changed shapes: We'd make up stories about what was happening up there in SkyWorld. Some of the stories had happy endings and some ended tragically as a gust of wind would blow the clouds into some fantastical shape. It was a pleasant way to spend a warm Alberta afternoon. Most often the sky was clear – (It is not called “Sunny Alberta without reason!) Our time of leisure would end with Mom or Dad calling us to do some chores.

But I could never imagine gazing skyward and seeing Jesus being lifted up to be seated at the right hand of His Father. It is no wonder that the Apostles stood aghast at the sight. Nor is it strange that they expected Him to come in glory very shortly. Like them, we can have some unrealistic expectations as well. People try to figure out when He will return or when our world will end, seeming to forget His words, “It is not for you to know the times or periods that the Father has set by His own authority.”

While we wait in anticipation for that day, we need to be prepared for it when arrives and gazing heaven-ward is not the way to prepare for that. We are supposed to engage ourselves in good works: feeding the hungry, clothing the naked, visiting the imprisoned and loving one another. We are meant to preach the Good News to others and that's a tall order.

I don't think that preaching that good news means for us to stand on street corners railing at others to change their sinful ways. I think it means living lives that make others want to know how it is that we're always happy and helpful: I think it means that when the opportunity arises we are ready with answers and when we answer, doing so with gentleness.

To be that kind of disciple we have to have the knowledge that underlies our faith and by not allowing our faith education to end at grade 8 but to continue throughout our lives. Sometimes the queries of those looking for answers can trouble us as we don't know the answer. That's when our library of Catholic teaching comes into play. We should all have access to “The Catechism of the Catholic Church”. I don't mean that we need to commit that book to memory but rather to have a working knowledge of where to find answers within that book: And rather than handing the questioner a copy of that book, to walk them gently to the answer.

Being a disciple requires that we know what our Lord teaches so it's also vital to read His words in Scripture. We can't be disciples simply by saying we're followers. Being disciples takes action, discipline and courage. It takes a loving heart, a listening ear, a heart open to the needs of others. It takes living a life that imitates the life of our Lord. So instead of standing and gazing up to heaven let's look around us and see where our Lord is calling us to serve Him.

St-Eugène de Mazenod: On Good Friday in 1807 after a mystical experience in which Eugene was touched by the full force of the love of God, he entered the seminary. He was ordained at the age of 29, on December 21, 1811. Eugene inspired other priests and laymen to work with him and formed the Missionaries of Provence, conducting parish missions throughout the region. As word of their success spread, Eugene realized the need for a formal organization, and in 1826 founded a new order, the Oblates of Mary Immaculate, whose ministry was to go to people who had never heard of Jesus and his Church.

December 2, 1841, Bishop De Mazenod's first overseas missionaries arrived in Canada. By the time of his death, there were six Oblates and over 400 missionaries working in ten countries. The Oblates continue their good work to this day with some 5000 missionaries in 68 countries. They staff missions posts, parishes and universities. Eugene De Mazenod died from cancer on May 21, 1861; his body was exhumed and found to be intact. He was beatified on October 19, 1975 and canonized December 3, 1995 by Pope John Paul II.

BRAEBURN CAMP for SACRED HEART PARISHIONERS: Fr. Slawek has booked Braeburn Camp from **July 9th to July 16th.** Everyone from our parish is welcome to come and enjoy Braeburn during that week. You can pitch a tent, bring your RV or register in advance to stay in a cabin (the cabins are limited: first to book, first served!) The kitchen will be available only for those who registered to stay 2 nights or more. To maintain health and safety measures, kitchen use will be organized by time slots, one family/social bubble at a time. **Canoes, paddles, fire pit, outhouses and other facilities are available for day-use as well, no advanced registration necessary.** You are welcome to give a donation to the parish to cover rental costs, all extra will go towards the NET fundraiser. **For more information and to register, [please visit our website.](#) To register by phone, call Fr. NET FUNDRAISING: We are grateful that our Diocese and Sacred Heart parish have brought a NET Ministries team to Whitehorse. The current NET team will be here until the end of May and a new team will come next October to continue the work that has been started. The team is involved in music ministry, leading the high school and middle school youth groups at Sacred Heart, doing outreach to youth in our high school, elementary schools and missions. They are part of a larger network of young missionaries who are taking a year off to bring Canadian youth towards a deeper love of Christ. They are here to support our Catholic schools and to be another avenue (peer-led) for inviting youth, whether Catholic, Christian or secular, into an authentic dialogue about faith and spirituality. The NET Project is an investment into Catholic youth ministry in the Yukon.

The Diocese and Sacred Heart are sharing this expense. The cost for the current team is approximately \$42,000. Sacred Heart is responsible for \$21,000. **We made a goal to raise \$25,000 for this year to cover any additional youth ministry costs. As of now, we've raised \$9,000! We ask for your prayers that their work will touch the hearts of our youth. MASS SIGN-IN: We have **2 sign-in sheets: 1 for the “Nave” FOR THOSE WHO ATTEND MASS FROM THE NAVE (Max 50 attendees)** and **1 for the balcony FOR THOSE WHO ATTEND MASS FROM THE BALCONY (Max 25 attendees)** Please sign-in on the correct sheet so we keep an accurate record for contact tracing purposes. When the sign-in sheet is full, we will close the doors. If you cannot attend physically, remember that the Saturday 5pm mass is recorded and uploaded online on the Diocese’s Facebook Page.

LITANY TO THE BLESSED VIRGIN MARY: After each weekday mass, **we are invited to pray the Litany to the Blessed Virgin Mary.** The Litany of Loreto takes its name from the Marian shrine of Loreto in Italy, where it is believed to have been used as far back as 1531. It was officially approved in 1587 by Pope Sixtus V, who suppressed all other Marian litanies used publicly. The Litany of Loreto is the only approved Marian litany. However, many more Marian litanies were and are in use, but are designated for private devotion, as is evident, for example, in the so-called *Officia Mariana*. Through the centuries at least 7 new invocations to Mary were added. Saint Pope John Paul II added “Mother of the Church” in 1980, and “Queen of families” in 1995. **Pope Francis has added three more in June 2020. “Mother of mercy”, “Mother of hope” and “Solace of migrants”.**

Please leave the laminated copies of the litany in the pews, there are paper copies you can take home at the back of the Church.

ADORATION: As Catholics, we believe that the gifts of bread and wine turn into the living body and blood of Christ! The Eucharist is more than a remembrance of Jesus’ sacrifice, but also an intimate encounter with Him. Sacred Heart Cathedral celebrates Adoration is every **Thursday from 7 - 8 p.m.** Come spend an hour with Him!

DIOCESAN and VATICAN NEWS AND EVENTS

SAFE ENVIRONMENT POLICY: The Diocese of Whitehorse **Safe Environment Policy has been updated and is now posted on its own webpage.** The purpose of the policy is to keep minors and vulnerable adults safe from harm while in the care of the Diocese of Whitehorse. It includes standards and safeguards to ensure that everyone who participates in ministry activities feels safe and protected. **The Safe Environment webpage also has information on the procedure for reporting incidents of abuse by individuals in ministry positions, including clergy (Priests, Deacons and the Bishop), lay staff, and volunteers.** Please see the Diocese’s webpage for more information.

PRAYERS FOR THE END OF THE PANDEMIC: Catholics across the globe are encouraged to dedicate the **Marian month of May to praying for an end to the pandemic.** “The initiative will involve all the Shrines of the world in a special way, so that they might encourage the faithful, families, and communities to recite the Rosary to pray for an end to the pandemic.”

WORLD COMMUNICATIONS DAY, MAY 16th: On 23 January 2021, the liturgical memorial of Saint Francis de Sales, patron saint of writers and journalists, the Holy See released the Holy Father's Message for the **55th World Communications Day**. The message is entitled "*Come and See*" (*Jn 1:46*). *Communicating by Encountering People Where and as They Are*. In his Message, Pope Francis emphasizes the importance of authentic human communication: "In order to tell the truth of life that becomes history, it is necessary to move beyond the complacent attitude that we 'already know' certain things. Instead, we need to go and see them for ourselves, to spend time with people, to listen to their stories and to confront reality, which always in some way surprises us. [...] **This year, then, I would like to devote this Message to the invitation to 'come and see', which can serve as an inspiration for all communication that strives to be clear and honest, in the press, on the internet, in the Church's daily preaching and in political or social communication. 'Come and see!'**"

In Canada, World Communications Day will be celebrated on 16 May 2021, the Solemnity of the Ascension of the Lord.
